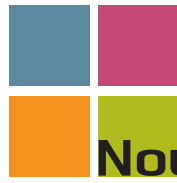
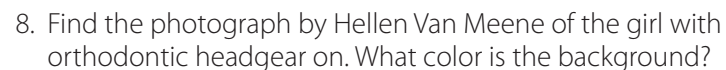
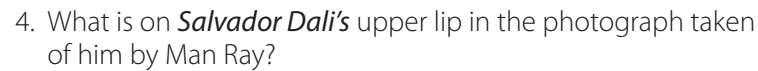





1. What is the last name of the photographer who combined four images of *Heinz* into one photograph?

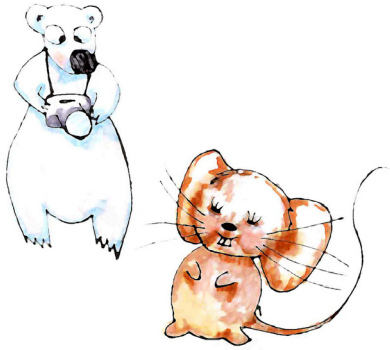
Jump!
